

EMMA SMITH SCHOLARSHIP AWARD WINNER - 2016

AMBITIOUS, HARDWORKING, EAGER AND ARTISTIC ARE SOME OF THE QUALITIES THAT BEST DESCRIBE SINETHEMBA NGUBANE WHO HAS EARNED HERSELF THE TITLE OF WINNER OF THE 2016 EMMA SMITH SCHOLARSHIP AWARD.

She developed a keen interest in art while she was still in high school and started drawing and making beautiful art pieces that everyone really loved. She soon she realised that this is not just a hobby, but a unique form of art that she wanted to turn into a profession.

"The art I create intends to generate awareness and critically rethink our stereotype perception of the human body and remove the stigma around biological sex and diversity in sexuality," she said.

Ngubane who is currently doing her Master's in Fine Art plans to open up her own studio where she will showcase and exhibit her artworks whilst also hosting workshops as part of her research, in the selective four religious rural areas of Newcastle, Emsinga, Ntambanani and Ezwelimbovu in KwaZulu-Natal.

During the workshops Ngubane plans to enrich and enhance the knowledge of communities by involving them in her creative process and allowing them to tell

their stories whilst she interprets it through her artwork through the inspiration of their stories, perceptions and experiences.

"Winning the Emma Smith scholarship is a dream come true for me and has opened up a world of endless opportunities for me as an artist who is still growing in this industry, but most importantly, though I want to sharpen the skills of artists who do not have the exposure or the opportunity for their work to be seen. I want to be that breakthrough for them," she said.

She aims to manage the increasing gap between art practices, activism and academic interest and also confront stereotypes of gender identity as her art mainly focuses on ambiguous gender identity and signifies the importance of society to acknowledge the existence of transgressive gender.

To be successful as an artist, Ngubane believes that one should be fully committed to their craft, be willing to go the extra mile and most importantly do not do the obvious because art is a unique way of creating awareness and uniting people.

GET TO KNOW DUT'S CONFUCIUS INSTITUTE

THE CONFUCIUS INSTITUTE (CD IS A CHINESE INSTITUTION BASED AT DUT. IT OFFERS A CHINESE CULTURE COURSE WHICH SERVES TO AID ATTENDEES WITH ELEMENTARY CHINESE LANGUAGE ALONG WITH BASIC KNOWLEDGE ABOUT CHINA AND THE CHINESE CULTURE.


On the 26 March 2013, in Pretoria, Madam Xu Lin, Chief executive CI Headquarters in Beijing, along with Professor Ahmed Bawa, Vice-Chancellor and Principal of DUT, signed the agreement of establishing the DUT Confucius Institute. The next day the establishment of DUT CI was formally announced. The institution however, began functioning during February 2014.

DUT CI is headed by Professor Graham Stewart and Dr Eddie Chaobo FU, who is an academician professor from Fujian Agriculture and Forestry University in Fuzhou, China. Dr FU is a language and culture teacher, researcher and scholar, and his doctoral background is on Chinese agricultural economy and management. He has served in various language teaching and research academic associations in Fujian, China. He has also served from 2006 to 2009 as a consul in the Consulate General of the People's Republic of China in Johannesburg. The institution has a total of 11 staff members and eight are from China. The other team members comprises of a special assistant to the Dean, Mr Deva Govindasamy, two Chinese teachers, five Chinese volunteer teachers and an administrative assistant.

The DUT CI has a lot of great aspiration when it comes to their goals and aims for 2016. They include offering the Mandarin course as a Gen Ed course to students at DUT after the pilot course and short courses have already been offered. Non-credited courses to be offered to DUT community and short courses will continue to be offered to DUT and local communities.

More cultural and exchange programmes will be designed to further promote the person-to-person engagements between China and South Africa. DUT and FAFU will work more closely to strengthen the partnership in various fields.





Since being in existence from 2014 the Confucius Institute has strived to fulfill its roles which are as follows:

- Teaching various Mandarin courses of all levels for different targeted learners.
- Introducing China and Chinese culture to South African communities.
- Promoting cultural, educational and academic exchanges between South Africa and China.
- Organising series of Chinese cultural events.
- Holding different Chinese Proficiency Test.
- 6. Organising Summer/Winter Camps to China.
- 7. Organising educators delegate from South Africa to visit China.
- 8. Training local Mandarin teachers and organising local teachers to attend training programs in China.
- 9. Assisting the CI learners to apply for CI scholarships from the Headquarters and Chinese government fellowships to pursue degrees.

- The Mandarin courses offered include Mandarin for universities and it is mainly designed to meet the needs of Mandarin/Chinese learning for University students and staff members; the Basic Mandarin course for primary and secondary school students with no or little Chinese language background; the Continuous Professional Education Course for the Durban Community and the Business Mandarin course for those who are interested in Chinese economy and business culture. All these courses cater for different audiences and aim to develop communicative competence in Chinese culture e.g. martial arts and Chinese calligraphy, to name but a few.
- The year 2015 has been both a dynamic and phenomenal year for the Confucius Institute, the
- year held a host of successful cultural events.

 Amongst some was the winter camp of 20 students to China, the Youth Chinese test, the Chinese Film festival, Chinese Bridge Competition, a summer camp of 20 students to China, Magic China: Chinese language and culture exhibition, Confucius Institute Day 2015, the Moon Festival Gala, Chinese Character writing competition and One Belt One Road and A Prosperous Africa Conference.
- The two Chinese-bridge Summer/Winter Camp to China served cultural and educational purposes.
 These trips enabled CI registered students to learn about modern China and experience Chinese culture more comprehensively. CI will also invite Chinese art groups to South Africa for performance and cultural exchanges every year.
- "Most students come to CI to learn Mandarin because they are interested in Chinese language and culture. But interest is not enough for learning Mandarin successfully. You have to stick to it. Where there's a will there's a way," added Dr FU. He goes on to say that language is the key to communication and culture. "Experiencing a different culture helps broaden their horizons. Especially the young people, they are the future of this country; they should take every opportunity to learn, to experience and to open their minds," he said.

DUT DRAMA STUDENTS PERFORM AT FOLKWANG SHAKESPEARE FESTIVAL



DURBAN UNIVERSITY OF TECHNOLOGY PROFESSOR DEBBIE LUTGE AND THE DUT DRAMA STUDENTS MADE THEIR WAY TO GERMANY TO PERFORM AT THE PRESTIGIOUS FOLKWANG SHAKESPEARE FESTIVAL.

Much Ado About Nothing, an innovating telling of one of Shakespeare's best loved comedies, was staged in Germany as part of a global exchange/research programme to honour the 400th anniversary of William Shakespeare's death. The esteemed Prof Debbie Lutge designed and directed a cast of 12 second and third year DUT Drama and Production students, who went in April, 2016.

Much Ado About Nothing is generally considered one of Shakespeare's most enduring comedies combining elements of robust hilarity with more serious meditations on honour, shame, and court politics.

The DUT version travelled to Essen-Werden in Germany to join productions from Krakow Poland; Melbourne Australia; Germany and Durban. It is the first production from Africa to take part in this innovative international Shakespeare project. They will perform at the Folkwang Shakespeare Festival to which participants must be invited to produce collaborative art.

"This production's exploratory process involved the creativity of the student cast where they explored text and history, creating original songs and choreographing dances as well as painting their own designs on sets designed by myself," said Lutge

The cast of 12 included Beatrice and Benedict (played by Holly Gxubane and Sfundo Maphumulo), Hero/Margaret and Claudius (Spokazi Poswa/Thandeka Shangase and Vuyolwethu Tshambula). Leonato was played by Andile Tevin Nsibande and Prince Don Pedro by Kwenzokuhle Ngcobo (who featured as Peron in the 2013 EVITA! staged in the Playhouse Drama). Dogberry and Verges were played by Thobani Nzuza and Nkanyiso Shezi. Don John was played by Thembinkosi Mthembu, Conrad by Malusi Mkhonza and Borachio by Zuzumuzi Mdamba.

The Festival happens every two years and this is the eighth time the festival is being held. "This year marks 400 years since the death of Shakespeare who died in April so the April festival in Essen-Werden is a significant one and we are indeed honoured to be one of the invited participants. Our participation was made possible by our Vice-Chancellor Prof Ahmed Bawa's approval, a phenomenal leader, with the vision to recognise the honour bestowed and the determination to facilitate the international exchange," she said.

On returning to Durban, the show has been invited to feature as part of the Uhuru Festival at Wushwini.

SUPPORTING YOUR STUDIES THROUGH E-LEARNING

What is e-learning?

e-Learning is when learning and teaching is assisted by technology in some way. It can mean anything from the use of a smartboard in class, accessing your lecture notes using your own phone or tablet, online quizzes or tests to support your learning or an entire course that is delivered online.

What is e-learning at DUT?

At DUT, when we talk about e-Learning we usually mean the ThinkLearnZone:

https://thinklearnzone.dut.ac.za/. When you log in to the TLZ, you will find a 'classroom' for each of the taught modules for which you are registered. Each classroom should contain the Study Guide for that module. For some modules, you might find the lecturer has uploaded other course materials, video clips or quizzes to the TLZ. The TLZ can also be used interactively – some classes use the TLZ to work together on projects or to hold group discussions. How you will work with the TLZ depends on your lecturer.

DUT uses the Blackboard Learning Management System to provide the classrooms on the TLZ. You may find TLZ referred to as Blackboard Mobile Learn when you are using TLZ via an App on your device.

What if I haven't used a computer or technology before?

Every year lots of students join DUT who have not yet had the opportunity to work with computers. Your lecturers are aware of this and you should be given instruction on how to use the technology. There are also devices available through the libraries and at some of the laboratories on campus where you can practise and develop your skills. We live in a digital world, and getting to grip with computers and technology is part of how DUT strives to prepare you for the workplace.

Where can I find support?

You can find Frequently Asked Questions such as how to log in to TLZ at the TLZ Helpdesk site: http://elearning.dut.ac.za/faq/faq_students/

How can I access TLZ?

TLZ will work on any PC, tablet or laptop as well as most newer smartphones. For your mobile devices, download the Blackboard Mobile Learn App and type in Durban University of Technology. You'll then be able to log in to the TLZ.

What is the future for e-Learning at DUT?

DUT has invested significantly in e-learning over the last few years. The wireless network on campus has been strengthened and extended to support a much greater number of users. The libraries have invested

substantially in providing a greater range and number of devices for students to use. Even more importantly, DUT has put in place the infrastructure behind the scenes which is needed to ensure TLZ keeps working well.

e-Learning helps students to continue to study outside of class at any time of the day which suits them. It can help students catch up with lecture notes if they have missed classes due to sickness. It also helps communication by allowing messages to be sent at any time of day, rather than waiting for your class to speak to your lecturer. e-Learning provides many benefits in how it supports teaching and learning, and we expect to see DUT further develop what is provided through the TLZ in future years.

PRAWN COCKTAIL SALAD

Serves I

Ingredients:

3 Peeled Prawns

10ml Lemon juice

10ml Olive oil

I Garlic clove, crushed

10ml Chilli flakes

10ml Tomato sauce

Salt and pepper to season

1/2 Lettuce head, julienned

I Avocado, sliced

1/4 Red peppers, julienned

Method:

- I. Wash prawns, and then marinate them with olive oil, lemon juice, chilli flakes, crushed garlic, tomato sauce and salt and pepper for 15 30 minutes in a glass bowl.
- 2. Remove the prawns from the marinate and grill on medium heat for 5 10 minutes or until cooked. Reserve the marinate to use as a sauce.
- 3. Place lettuce, avocado, red pepper and the grilled prawns on a side plate.
- 4. Pour the reserved marinate on the prawn cocktail salad and serve.

RYE CRACKER EGG MUSHROOM SANDWICH

Serves I

Ingredients:

- 2 Rye bread crackers
- I Egg
- 3 Button Mushrooms, sliced
- 2 Cherry tomatoes cut in half
- 4 Sliced Cucumber

10ml Olive oil

Salt and pepper to season

Method:

- I. Heat olive oil on medium heat and sauté mushrooms for 10 minutes or until cooked, then remove from heat.
- 2. Beat egg in a bowl, season with salt and pepper and microwave for 3 minutes and remove from microwave and cut in half.
- 3. Lay the eggs on each rye bread cracker, and then top off with the sliced cucumber, mushrooms and the half cut cherry tomatoes.
- 4. Serve with sauce of your choice.
