Dear staff and students

The third wave of the COVID-19 pandemic is officially over as infection and death rates have fallen substantially when compared to the past few months. This is good news. However, public health experts confirm that COVID-19 has not disappeared and that we are still facing a high probability of a fourth wave of the pandemic. How bad this fourth wave turns out to be is up to all of us. To **#SaveOurSummer** and to flatten the fourth wave, get your vaccine as soon as possible to ensure that you are fully vaccinated in time for the end-of-year holiday season. Importantly, continue to take the basic precautions of wearing a mask, social distancing and practising good hand hygiene.

Towards a more "normal" 2022

If everyone gets vaccinated, DUT will be able to move towards increased contact learning and teaching sessions, as well as more physical events like graduation. A good example of how vaccination can open up our world once more was the recent football World Cup qualifying match between Bafana Bafana and Ethiopia, where fully vaccinated fans were allowed into the stadium free of charge. The practice of allowing event access to only fully vaccinated people is a worldwide trend that is likely to become commonplace, including here in South Africa.

A public health emergency

Experts agree that COVID-19 remains a very serious public health emergency that requires decisive action by each one of us. Getting fully vaccinated not only prevents you, the individual, from developing severe illness, being hospitalised and possibly dying, it also drastically reduces the likelihood that you will spread COVID-19 to others. We in South Africa often live communally, both as extended families, in hostels and in university residences. Regardless of our age and state of health, we have a responsibility to vulnerable members of society, such as senior citizens and people with chronic illnesses, to get vaccinated for the common good.

We are here to hear your fears

Many people have fears and questions about the vaccines. This is not surprising as the spread of misinformation continues at a rapid pace. The COVID-19 Response Task Team wishes to reassure the DUT community that the vaccines are safe and effective and we urge you to consult only reputable sources of information for answers to your vaccine questions.







Some social media platforms are overrun with vaccine misinformation. So much so that Facebook recently disabled 150000 user accounts that were spreading COVID-19 misinformation. Fake news can have deadly consequences.

Ivermectin has not been scientifically shown to be effective in treating or preventing COVID-19. It is not an approved COVID-19 medicine.


Pfizer second dose appointments
