DUT ALUMNI MAKES AN IMPACT, ADDRESSING SOCIAL **CHALLENGES THROUGH FASHION**

Balini Naidoo-Engelbrecht, a visionary fashion designer from Saldanha Bay, has made a name for herself since graduating with Cum Laude honours in Fashion and Textiles Design from the Durban University of Technology (DUT).

urrently based in Saldanha Bay on the West Coast of Western Cape, Naidoo-Engelbrecht founded Balini TM after completing her studies at DUT six years ago. Her passion for fashion has earned her numerous prestigious accolades.

Naidoo-Engelbrecht's journey began with a personal experience – witnessing the challenges faced by a visually impaired family member while selecting clothing. This sparked her commitment to empowerment and innovative design. Today, her braille designs are being applied to affordable leisure wear for the visually impaired.

Her remarkable story is a testament to the power of dreams and dedication.

In 2015, she found herself among the elite Top 10 designers acknowledged by the distinguished Society of Dyers and Colourists.

She continued to shine the following year, earning a spot among the top 25 designers at the Vodacom Durban July Young Designer Awards in 2016.

In 2018, Naidoo-Engelbrecht's innovative designs stole the spotlight at the Design Indaba Emerging Creative Class of 2018.

That same year, she was honoured with a nomination as a Southern African Development Community Top 100 Innovator.

In 2019, she served as a Goalkeeper for the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, impacting change on a global scale. The status of Golkeeper recognises leaders who are pushing forward the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The year 2022 heralded fresh accomplishments as she received a nomination for the prestigious Tamil Business Award in the Woman in Business Category.

A significant highlight for Naidoo-Engelbrecht was on 31 May 2022 when she was presented with a Parliamentary Award, celebrating her groundbreaking Braille Identification System. The acknowledgement was a testament to her unwavering dedication to recognising and addressing the needs of individuals with sight impairments.

Beyond fashion, Naidoo-Engelbrecht collaborated with the Wits Health Consortium at Vredenburg Provincial Hospital on the "EMove in the





Maternity Ward" research study which focused on preventing Postpartum Haemorrhage.

Through her partnership with a local youth hub, Naidoo-Engelbrecht provided transformative sewing classes in 2022, bridging the skills gap for unemployed youth and paving the way for economic empowerment.

Recent accomplishments include winning the Woolworths Youth Maker competition (2024). Her new range will be showcased at selected stores.

The fashion fundi also formed a partnership with Dove to create a show-stopper brailleinspired dress for the Hollywood Bets Durban July (2024).

Naidoo-Engelbrecht's aspirations stretch far beyond the catwalk. Her mission is to inspire designers to address Africa's challenges through innovative solutions, emphasizing honesty, integrity, and charisma.

Naidoo-Engelbrecht's story is a testament to resilience, determination, and the celebration of diversity. "Your actions shape your legacy," she said, echoing Nelson Mandela's wisdom.

Beyond the realm of fashion, Naidoo-Engelbrecht's legacy is built on inclusivity, empathy, and unwavering dedication. At the helm of Balini TM, she charts a course for limitless possibility.

For Naidoo-Engelbrecht, a typical day begins with dropping off her three-year-old daughter at school, followed by administrative duties and customer orders.

When asked about her goals, she said: "There is so much more in store, including a five-year plan that is underway, but over the years I have learned to leave it in God's hands because he knows the plans of my heart," she explained.

On inclusive fashion, she noted: "It's not about the latest trends, shades or styles, but making an impact and addressing social challenges."

Naidoo-Engelbrecht is currently pursuing accreditation as a trainer.

Her advice to new designers: "Be passionate. Having a story behind your creation, being unique, pushing boundaries and addressing social challenges in your designs are pivotal," she said.

Her expert advice to future student designers at DUT is to find a unique style and keep it consistent.

"Don't try to copy what has already been done. We live in a country with such rich cultures and that should breathe through our designs. Always think out of the box and always remember form follows function," she advised.

WHERE CODING MEETS COMMUNITY: THEMBELIHLE QUEEN HADEBE'S **INSPIRING PROGRAMME**

Thembelihle Queen Hadebe, a driven Honours ICT student at Durban University of Technology, founded the Coding and Robotics Programme to enhance STEM education in grassroots communities.

The Coding and Robotics Programme, which started in 2023, trains educators in coding and electronics, while also directly instructing learners, preparing them for tech-driven careers.

The concept emerged in 2022, but Hadebe struggled to bring it to life. Enrolling in DUT's IoT programme, she met Senior Lecturer Ebrahim Asmal, who was working on a similar project. Their collaboration sparked a breakthrough.

"Traditional educational systems often lag behind technological advancements, leaving students unprepared for today's job market. Many students at community level struggle with STEM skills. This lack of proficiency threatens job prospects and exacerbates the unemployment crisis," she explained.

Despite a slow start earlier this year, Hadebe's Coding and Robotics Programme has made significant strides. Over 1000 educators have been trained, and the 2023 RoboGirl winners have received further education on advanced technology. Additionally, an exciting event is in the works under Hadebe's programme —teaching students from the DUT community to operate drones using a simulator.

The programme won first prize at the Engagement Showcase and Pitching Awards 2024, underscoring its impact and success.

Hadebe emphasises: "This initiative is not only about fostering innovation and reducing unemployment but also about securing a better future for the community as a whole," she said.

Siphelele Mkhize: First-year Electrical Engineering student



DUT WOMEN'S RUGBY TEAM MAKES HISTORY

WITH KZNRU MURRAY CUP WIN

The Durban University of Technology's (DUT) women's rugby team recently cemented their dominance on the pitch, claiming the KwaZulu-Natal Rugby Union (KZNRU) Women's Murray Cup for the first time.

The thrilling 29-0 victory over Varsity College at the Riverside Varsity College Sport Complex marked a triumphant moment in the team's history.

After falling short in last year's semifinals against the University of Kwa-Zulu-Natal (UKZN), the Warriors secured their redemption, walking away with the coveted cup worth R30,000.

Star players Karthy Dludla and Sinenhlanhla Luthuli took home the Player of the Series (R5,000) and Player of the Match (R1,000) awards, respectively.

Coach Bongumusa Mvelase attributed the win to the team's tireless efforts, teamwork, and unwavering belief. "We are very excited to have won this cup. After we have won a preseason, Source Cup and KZN Women's Premiere, we believe we can win any cup," said Mvelase.

Mvelase praised the team's head coach, Archie Moko, for his invaluable experience. As a former Sharks Women's head coach, he brought a wealth of knowledge to our team," added Mvelase.

Team captain Nomusa May said this win was an emotional one because they worked very hard as a team in preparing for this cup.

"I was very emotional and ecstatic. The ladies worked very hard for this massive win and to finally achieve this is incredible. I am so proud of my team and hounoured to be part of this journey. The amount of commitment from the ladies throughout the season has led us to this win," said May.

This victory follows the team's impressive debut at the University Sports South Africa (USSA) Rugby Champions, where they won the Cup in Section C. The tournament took place in Grahamstown from 2-4 July 2024.
