Sangari SA CEO, Bez Sangari said the F1 in Schools Challenge has the full backing of Formula One and is currently the only race for scholars at provincial, national and international level with the Bernie Ecclestone Trophy as the ultimate prize. "The hope is to make scholars more conscious of science and technology, see science as fun. What better way to do that than with F1 racing. We are currently trying to introduce this competition at tertiary level and have approached a few institutions which are eager to join, including DUT. Hopefully we will have it up and running on a tertiary level by next year", he said.

Industrial Engineer lecturer, Ranil Singh said the challenge is exciting as students were required to work on aerodynamics which is outside of their academic curriculum. All participating students were required to create model F1 racing cars according to design and manufacture specifications. The end product was then assessed and points contributed to the students' year end mark.

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"This was a great learning curve for the students in terms of team dynamics and communication, as students had to create the whole experience from resourcing the materials, acquiring funds and marketing the cars. This is a way to make learning exciting", he said.

In the run up to the event, Team Radical Manager, Thapelo Mohajane said his team wanted to prove they were the best and decided to meet once a week to focus on their project. The work was divided into groups and individual strengths were identified - from this each member was tasked accordingly.

Innovation Award for student

The South African Institute of Electrical Engineers (SAIEE) recently awarded an undergraduate student from the Durban University of Technology with first prize for Innovation at the 2009 SAIEE National Student Project Competition.

The event was held on 20 November at the University of KwaZulu-Natal's Howard College (UKZN) and was open to all universities and universities of technology across South Africa.

B.Tech student, Dave Callaghan's invention of a portable digital audio reproduction device, the Shelf Talker, won the Innovation Award for its dynamic engineering and ingenuity.

He said: "I'm exhilarated and very happy. It's a wonderful achievement for myself and DUT. The competition was neck and neck with Cape Peninsula University of Technology. This award may also provide some impetus for further development of the project, its manufacturing, marketing and funding."

Callaghan said the Shelf Talker is an electronic device which was specifically created for marketing purposes and can be used as a non-intrusive marketing tool. Its concept stems from the move from visual to audio marketing for the promotion of retail products.

The device can be powered with a battery, is robust and compact and uses a reprogrammable memory card for audio storage. It is cost effective, and the memory card is designed to hold up to three minutes of audio, however this can be increased to six minutes with the use of a larger memory chip.

He said: "The idea behind the innovation was that I wanted to create a product that could play a series of marketing messages that could be triggered in different ways. Or alternatively it could play a single three or six minute message, this would ideally work well at car exhibitions, for queue management, public venues and government departments, malls and trade shows to market a product or service without the use of a sales or marketing representative. It is not intrusive marketing and allows interested people and customers to listen to the message while simultaneously doing other things."

Callaghan obtained his National Higher Diploma in Electrical Engineering: Light Current from Technikon Natal in 1987 and intends working towards his Master's degree in Electrical Engineering Digital Communication next year. He lectured a course on Digital Systems at Technikon Natal upon completion of his diploma and worked in industry as a Development Engineer for the last 22 years. Callaghan possesses a passion for embedded microcontroller developments using Microchip's PIC microcontrollers. As technical as that may seem, it in essence forms the component in the main Printed Circuit Board (PCB) assembly which forms the programmable device in the Shelf Talker. The microcontroller controls how the audio messages are triggered and played.

Students' wooden creations take the prize

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Mlu wins young artist award for dance

Thirty four-year old Durban born-and-bred Mlu Zondi, is the 2010 Standard Bank Young Artist Award winner for dance.

This dynamic, out-of-the-box performer moves seamlessly between the stage, gallery and public spaces, and challenges the boundaries of the dance discipline with his cutting edge performance art, video and multimedia installations.

"As a young artist, winning this award puts you on the forefront of the South African art scene. It boosts your confidence immensely, allowing you to create without the self-censorship that comes with uncertainty. You also get a huge platform at the National Arts Festival, exposing your work to a wider audience. What more can you ask for!" said an excited Zondi.

"Mlu is thoughtful, considerate and a complex creator and performer," said Jay Pather, National Arts Festival committee member for dance, and a previous lecturer of Zondi's. "He is a substantial thinker and creates work that is evocative as well as enigmatic and mysterious. He is not your average 'flash' dancer, and will more likely sweep one away with a quiet anarchy and a profound intelligence than try to please you with superficial entertainment," he added.

Zondi describes his early experiences as an orphan growing up with an extended family as instrumental in his drive to perform. Growing up in the 1980s and early 1990s he was active as a Pansula dancer, and felt that performance allowed him to stand out and be special.

His urge to study with no financial meant he worked as a petrol attendant for three years after matriculating, saving for his further studies. This tenacity and endurance is still evident in his work, in a context where the level of experimentation and risk in performance culture is rare.

"My works are my confrontations with issues that haunt me: identity, relationships and childhood memoirs. Suppressed emotions emerge during creations and performances that become therapeutic," he said. "As a performer with a theatre background, I had to find a style that will not only expose itself in one genre, but can actually be celebrated in a variety of artistic platforms," he said.

After completing a performance diploma at the Durban University of Technology (DUT), Zondi worked in commercial and corporate theatre for a while. His career as an international performer and artistic director was launched when he was invited to do a residency in Switzerland in 2002, with an opportunity to perform at the Lausanne International Dance Festival.

His exceptional talent and determination, combined with his ability to maximize opportunities, opened the doors to various international grants and residencies, and has led to multiple award nominations.

"My work incorporates various genres, including video-art and installations. With this Young Artist Award I want to develop the creations even further, and I want to instil a signature style of performance art video installations using dance as a base for performance and body politics," said Zondi.

Zondi's dance / installation crossover experimentation paid off in 2006, when he won the MTN New Contemporaries Award for his work, Silhouette. He was nominated for both the MEC Gauteng Best Original Choreography and the Durban Theatre Awards Best Choreographer awards as well. Zondi's first dance residency was with Boyzie Cekwana's Floating Outfit Projects in Durban in 2001. In 2002 he attended a residency with Theatre Sevelin 36 in Lausanne, Switzerland and in 2003 he completed a residency with the FNB Dance Umbrella in Johannesburg.

Since then, Zondi has taken part in various international residencies. In 2007 he was dancing on the stages of South Korea in the Seoul Performing Arts Company's Orpheus. In 2008 he was in Spain with the Rodriguez-Amat Foundation of Contemporary Arts and in Belgium with the KVS Theatre in Brussels, as well as with the Bains: Connective Art Laboratory. In October 2009, he attended the prestigious Kuns: Raum Foundation in Sylt Quelle, Germany.

Even with all of the international recognition, Zondi's integrity remains paramount.

He speaks about his creations as an outlet for his own emotional journey. "The object is to see how far the work can grow and how it will look once it is complete," he said. "That challenge keeps me working all the time, as there will always be new material to be added to the work and new structures to be included. That means I will never be out of work and will always have a space to crush my demons."

DUT recognises the importance of e-skills

Eidos Chief Executive Officer, Bruce Muirhead has been promoting the development of e-Skills networks across the country in various educational institutes, most recently at the Durban University of Technology.

Muirhead addressed DUT's executive management, the Information Society Institution, and the e-Skills Institute of the Department of Communications, DUT staff and general public at a public lecture at DUT.

He related the key steps necessary for implementing a successful e-Skills network and discussed the importance of including members from the community, universities, industry and government.

"The collaboration of these members of society is imperative in the success of the e-Skills development process. Also a clear and easily comprehensible goal or objective is required in order to ensure that this network does not succumb to failure", said Muirhead.

During this presentation, Prof Wesso of the Meraka e-skills Institute pointed out that in South Africa, there is a huge shortage of e-Skills human capital development. This is due to the lack of demand of e-

Skilled experts in the labour market as well as the high exodus of SA citizens to other countries that offer better working conditions. To respond to this challenge the government formed the Meraka e-Skills Institute and an e-Skills Council. The e-Skilles Council consists of the Ministers of Communication, Trade and Industry, Public Service and Administration, Education, Science and Technology, Labour and individuals elected by the Presidential International Advisory Council members.

The Meraka e-skills Institute has created a collaborative effort which is 'building on existing institutional e-skills capacity.' "We acknowledge that the gap between FET colleges and Universities is incredibly steep to the point whereby the FET College's standards are much higher than those of the perceived better institutions. However, Meraka's primary objective is to introduce the Korean styled e-Skilled literacy level in the early childhood development stage" said Meraka manager, Prof Wesson.

Executive Dean of Engineering and the Built Environment and Deputy Vice-Chancellor: Academic (Acting), Prof Theo Andrew said: "The key is always a moral purpose. The hope is to develop the skills of good thinkers, researchers and public leaders from an early age. This is also what the Meraka eskills Institute hopes to achieve."

The Small Enterprise Development Agency (SEDA) will also provide the necessary business skills training which will assist with developing sustainable businesses. The chosen designs will be remanufactured by the small businesses and sold to the municipality as gifts for various events as part of their expanded public works programme.

The prizes were awarded at the closing ceremony of the eThekwini SMME Fair on 27 September 2009 at the DBN Exhibition Centre.
