Proposed Sustainable Development Hub at DUT - Invitation to Participate

The Durban University of Technology's (DUT) Department of Town Planning has proposed the implementation of a Sustainable Development Hub at Steve Biko Campus.

Town Planning HOD, Alan Hansen said the technical study aims to showcase DUT through facilitating education and research on-site, reducing transport and other logistical costs, better securing equipment, and enabling easy monitoring. The core will encompass a water system which will simulate a natural system with constantly flowing water in drainage channels. The water will pass through retention ponds bordered by appropriate terrestrial and aquatic vegetation, for study by students, staff and possibly other interested parties. Water will be pumped from the lowest point of the system, to the top of the campus to keep a constantly flowing system.

Hansen said: "The purpose of the water system is to provide a physical, living experiment to facilitate and focus interdisciplinary and cross-field education, research, training, innovation, invention, publication and community outreach that is sustainable and practical." He said the department aims to include disciplines from all faculties including non-academic departments with the growth and maintenance of the project. The proposed study will include areas such as environmental conservation, ecology, renewable energy, water and waste management.

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engineering issues, health concerns, commerce applications.

"DUT has allocated R2 million as seed funding for the preparation of the detailed proposal in order to obtain funding and support from the private and corporate sector. The estimated cost for the implementation of the project is in the region of R20 million. Further research will be conducted to provide full costs for the project's long term maintenance. We are also in the process of setting up a website dedicated to this project, however the projects development can be monitored through the institution's website", said Hansen.

He said the project is in its early stages of development and participation of academics and non academics in the preparation of the final proposal is welcomed.

DUT hosts Formula One Challenge

The Durban University of Technology's (DUT) Industrial Engineering Department will host KwaZulu-Natal's (KZN) first Formula One racing challenge in 2010 in conjunction with Sangari SA, one of South Africa's leading engineering manufacturing and education solution companies. The DUT F1 Race Challenge will be run in accordance to the international criteria that is currently being adopted by the UK based F1 In Schools competition.

Industrial Engineering lecturer and event co-ordinator, Ranil Singh said the competition will be open to all maths, science and technology students from schools, Further Education and Training (FET) colleges and universities across KZN. DUT will hold its race presentation day on 23 November 2009 at Fred Crookes Sport Centre, Steve Biko Campus. Keen schools will be provided with a detailed breakdown of the competition criteria. The regional competition will showcase students' skills in areas such as design, analysis, manufacturing, testing, racing and communication abilities on a 20m race track.

The competition is open to all students between the ages of 11 and 18, scholars are requested to enter as a team. The team that builds the fastest gas powered race car will be awarded with a grand prize at the 2010 DUT F1 Race Challenge Awards ceremony and will go onto participate against other provincial winners at the national finals. Winners from the different categories will participate in the International F1 In Schools Competition to be held in Singapore in 2010.

Singh said: "The DUT F1 Race Challenge is still in its infancy. However, the Department of Industrial Engineering has adopted this venture as a long term sustainable community development project. We are currently looking for sponsorships from the corporate and private sector to help kickoff the schools competition. The race challenge is geared to help learners understand technology and implement the knowledge that is made available to them with the ultimate aim of increasing the number of science and engineering students at tertiary institutions across the country."

He said: "This, in broader terms, will contribute to the development of the scarce skills in South Africa in future. Ideally we would like entrants who possess the aptitude for design and manufacture to follow in the footstep of DUT alumnus, Gordon Murray, designer of the Mclaren race car. This is a unique opportunity for our department to help hone and perfect the skills of future leaders in engineering and science. He said the competition will also expose learners to different skills that will be necessary in the designing, drawing, fund-raising, marketing and the manufacturing process of their vehicles."

A book on Bandanas Beyond Borders

National Bandana Day was celebrated across the country this month in recognition of the struggle leukemia sufferers' face on a daily basis. Celebrations are held annually on October 14 with the aim of boosting the morale of cancer patients, as well as raising funds urgently needed for tissue typing more donors. The day also commemorates the lives lost to the fight against the dreaded blood disorder.

The South African based Sunflower Fund is an organization manufacturing bandanas which are sold in sub-campaigns around the country to raise funds for research, cancer treatment and medical procedures.

In 2008, Durban University of Technology's (DUT) Department of Fashion and Textile students won the Sunflower Fund competition after they manufactured and sold 250 000 bandanas in an effort to raise funds for the national campaign.

In support of the initiative this year, DUT launched a book titled *Bandanas Beyond Borders* at the Brickfield campus on National Bandana Day. The book project is a joint effort from the Centre for Research Capacity Development (CRCD), Postgraduate Development and Support, and the Department of Fashion and Textile.

Penned by Fashion and Textile lecturer, Mark Pywell, the book encapsulates the motivation for its publishing as well as undergraduate students' research, design and images of bandanas manufactured by DUT students. "It makes me very proud that the bandana book project has come to fruition. It's lovely to see one's own work in print," said Pywell.

Addressing DUT's academic community at the book launch, Prof Annelie Jordaan (acting DVC: Technology Innovation and Partnerships), congratulated the Fashion and Textile Department for their feat

She said: "We are here to launch this publication while highlighting the humanitarian cause that draws attention to the holistic nature of education offered by DUT. I am particularly pleased that undergraduate students are exposed to some elements of research while participating in this project. This is important as it lays the foundation for students to progress seamlessly to higher degree studies."

The publishing of the book proved that the initiative sowed the seeds of critical thinking through the intervention of research.

George Vorster, Fashion and Textile HOD, said the book launch was a proud achievement for both the department and the students who worked tirelessly on the project. "The print on the fabric used for the bandanas were uniquely designed and printed by students. A very big thank you to all involved in making the bandana project a success."

Faculty of Arts and Design Executive Dean, Dr Kenneth Netshiombo said: "This programme has been doing wonders all the time and it makes me feel we are doing the right thing. There is no small or big project; it is the impact that matters. This is a humble beginning and a first step towards bigger things to come".

CRCD Director and editor of the book, Prof Gansen Pillay, coordinated the book's design and was responsible for the catchy title. He said: "Being diagnosed with leukemia is an emotional experience, the patient's entire life changes. It is our job to see people develop and this book is an attempt to capture that spirit. This book is a small beginning of a number of publications to come."

DIFF celebrates 100 years of Electric Cinema in Durban

The Durban International Film Festival (DIFF) recently celebrated its 30th milestone in style presenting over 200 screenings at 27 venues across the district. The public session titled: From the Manuscripts of Timbuktu to the 100 Years of Electric Cinema in Durban, consisted of a panel which included film directors such as Zola Maseko, Cherif Keita and Durban University of Technology (DUT) lecturer, Dr Mikhail Peppas. The opening event was held at the city's Royal Hotel.

Durban's first film theatre, the Electric Cinema, opened on 29 July, 1909. This cinema once stood in Pixley Kaseme Street opposite the City Hall where the Medwood Gardens now stands. The following year a cinema reserved for "coloureds" exclusively, was created.

Information stored on micro-film at Durban's oldest newspaper, *The Mercury*, and Durban's architectural repositories indicate that activities surrounding film making in South Africa led directly to the use of news reels as propaganda tools. These were used to motivate support during World War 2. These documents also reveal the political and cultural environment and the segregation and integration of communities. However, little has been documented about these cinemas.

Dr Peppas said: "South Africans only became fully aware of film making during Britain's war propaganda efforts to smear the Afrikaners in the Anglo-Boer War (1899-1902) and the Spion Kop war. These formally introduced the trend of film making which focused primarily on war films, propaganda films and the news reel."

On the topic of the contemporary South African film industry, Maseko and Keita said internationally funded films predominantly focused on strife and famine and a need existed to produce films which focused on preserving African culture, heritage and encouraged the spirit of Ubuntu.

Open source the way to go

Mdletshe said: "We have taken four DUT interns and they are currently situated at the port assisting staff."

The first year students were accompanied by the Maritime lecturers Mr Leon Govender, Mr Crispen Camp and Mr Damir Turkovic, who between them have at least 30 years of working experience at sea.

"The aim of this class excursion is to not only expose the students to their future workenvironment, but to also visualise and conceptualise some of the concepts taught in subjects such as Sea Transport. It also gives students insight into the future expansion of the Port of Durban and with expansion comes career opportunities not only with Transnet, but within the broader maritime sector," said Govender

After the presentation the students were allowed to explore and ask questions.

Maritime student Kyle Floris said: "I found this trip to be really informative. I learnt what Transnet is about and I got to see ships. I am really excited about the career path that I have chosen because I would love to travel the world and to be out there, at sea."

The exhibition that took place at DUT's Ritson Hall helps many DUT graduates secure good positions with reputable organisations.

The Co-operative Education Department organises, co-ordinates and facilitates the exhibition in an effort to promote interaction between companies and students and this year, over 45 companies participated to support their course.

Among the companies that committed themselves to a long term partnership with DUT were Whirlpool, which is taking six students from Engineering, Finance, Information Technology (IT) and HR in their graduate trainee programme. They only take students from DUT because they believe they meet the standard required by their company.

"Students from DUT are top class," said Geoffrey Zulu, the Human Resource manager at Whirlpool. Zulu said their seven-year relationship with DUT had assisted them in employment equity policies and in moving the company forward. Whirlpool was the major sponsor of the exhibition, giving away a refrigerator and a chest freezer to winners of their quiz competition.

Toyota talents manager, Travis Cairns said they are also very happy and satisfied with their working relationship with DUT. Toyota's graduate trainee programme began in 2003 recruiting 50 students every year. This year 70% of these trainees are from DUT and Cairns said they are looking forward to working with even more DUT students next year. Toyota is also sponsoring the university through their Corporate Social Investment (CIS) programme.

Another company which plans to takestudents through their graduate trainee programmes or inservice training is Apollo, formerly known as Dunlop, which currently has six interns, all from DUT. Afrox, Eskom, Hulamin, Tongaat Hulett Sugar and Transnet also showcased their trainee programmes, pledging to take engineering, finance, marketing, HR, IT and students with scarce skills such property valuation and environmental health.

The selection of companies invited covered careers in all programmes offered by DUT across the university's six faculties thus giving every final year and post-graduate student a company to relate to.
